A sea turtle's gender is determined by the temperature of the sand. Cooler sand produces males. Warmer sand produces females.


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Jellyfish don't have brains, hearts, stomachs, or eyes! They do have mouths, which they use to eat, swim, and use the bathroom.

Sperm whales make the loudest sound of any animal. It's even louder than a jet engine!


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The Great Barrier Reef is the largest coral reef in the world. It can be seen from the moon!

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Folding Instructions

1. Print out the Fact Teller and cut along the dotted lines.
2. Flip the paper over so that the blank side is facing you.
3. Create a valley fold by folding the opposite corners towards each other, making a triangle. Unfold and repeat with the opposite corners. Unfold. You should have an X shaped crease.
4. Fold each corner towards the center of the paper. You should end up with a smaller square.
5. Flip your paper over.
6. Fold each corner to the center, creating an even smaller square.
7. Fold the square in half. Unfold, and refold in the opposite direction.
8. While it is still folded in half, slide your thumb and pointer finger of each hand under the flaps, one finger per flap. Pinch the paper between your fingers, and push the four outside corners together.

How to Play

1. Have a friend or family member choose one of the dolphin photos. For this example, we will use the red dolphin.
2. Open and close the Fact Teller in alternating directions for each letter of the word red, R-E-D. Stop on the last letter.
3. When you stop, have your friend or family member pick one of the visible numbers. For this example, we will use 5.
4. Open and close the Fact Teller in alternating directions as you count to that number, 5 in this case. Stop once you reach 5.
5. Have your friend or family member pick another number. Open that flap and read the fact underneath.
